### Welcome



Since our last Newsletter we are very pleased to welcome John Stokoe as one of our new volunteers, especially as he is now one of our much needed drivers. Thank you, John.

### Please note

Because of the amazing database created by Rosemary Clark, we can readily identify the jobs we have been able to do. However, we realise that not every completed task is being recorded on the system. Sometimes a volunteer forgets to tell the Phone Holder the job is done. Please remember to inform the Phone Holder about each job you do. Volunteers on a rota need only tell the Phone Holder if there are any changes, ie not after every rota job.



### How have we helped?



In 2015 the total number of calls received on the

Helping Hands phone was 305 and the total number of tasks was 610! We now have a number of regular rotas so villagers don't need to book these through the Phone Holder. Thank you, Anne Wells for organising our various rotas.

This compared with 2014, our first full year, we received 178 calls and 365 jobs were completed, so the number of times we help has gone up by 67%!

In 2015, nearly half the jobs were for transport – 293 out of 610. This is why we always need more volunteers to offer driving.

The next highest type of request was for befriending at 64, followed by shopping requests, including prescriptions at 52. Gardening is next at 38.

2016 has started off at the same rate as 2015. All your efforts are appreciated by the Committee and of course by the various people in the community who have been helped by Helping Hands.

## Funding



Initially we were very successful in attracting grants to set up from a number of organisations, but now we are established it is more difficult to attract funding. Our Treasurer, John Lomas, is concerned that we won't be able to cover our costs by the end of the year. One of the expenses we have is insurance and this has gone up massively. We need public liability insurance to protect volunteers. It has gone up from £180 to £328.50 even though we chased other providers to try to get a better quote. Currently we are protected by the Royal Sun Alliance, a respected insurer, but we will try again to get a more competitive quote when the insurance comes up for renewal in November.

If you have any connections with organisations who may be willing to make a grant, please contact us. We can definitely prove we're a worthwhile cause!

Ostrich. This helped the cubs with their community involvement work and we hope will brighten up, for a month at least one of the key routes through the village.


## Pat on the back
